



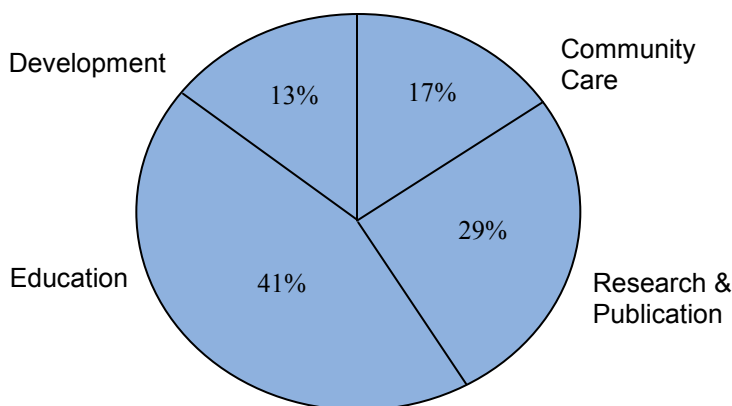
Enhancing Quality of Life through the Science of Orthopaedic Medicine

Education (41%)

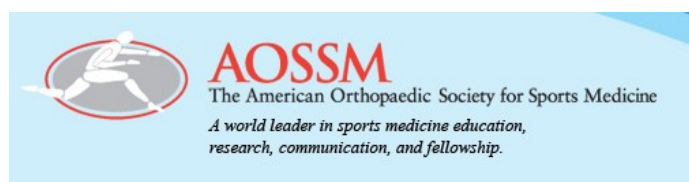
CAMPBELL HAPPENINGS
